There are many ancient cities in the world, but Varanasi is the only continuously inhabited city. Lord Buddha gave his first sermon at Sarnath in 528 BC-12 km from Varanasi after gaining atonement under holy Banyan tree at Bodhgaya, now in state of Bihar.

The city presents a microcosm of Hinduism steeped in traditional culture of India glorified in Hindu mythology attracted by visitors-including non Hindus around the world for different reasons all the time.

Some photo on Varanasi aspect is here which I took during my tours and I wish to visit city again.




























We found plenty of Sand Lizards on the same locality as the Meadow Vipers.

Southern Sand Vipers in their temporary home in the bag before release back to the Nature.


















